

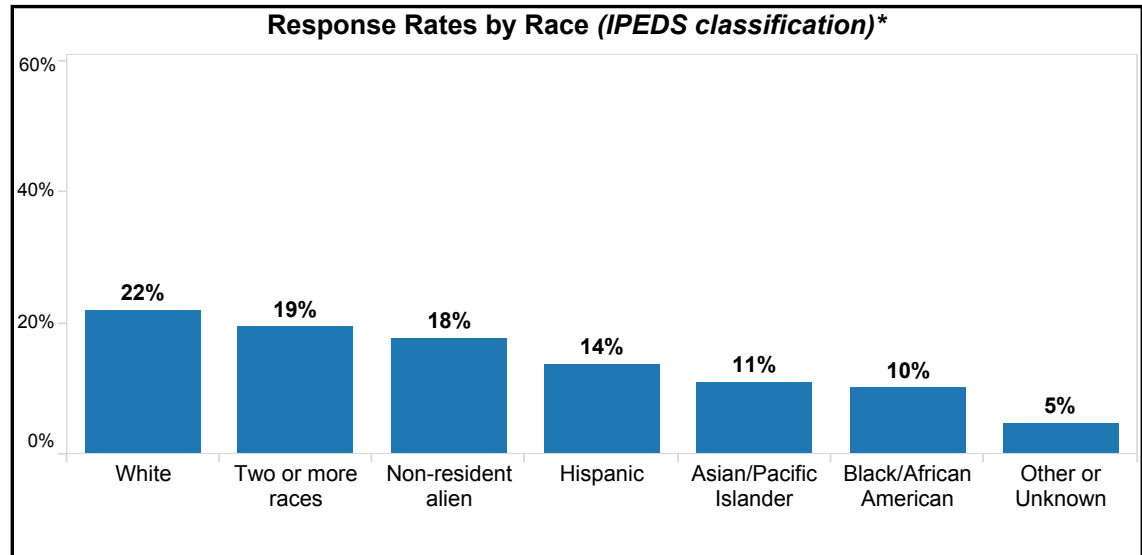
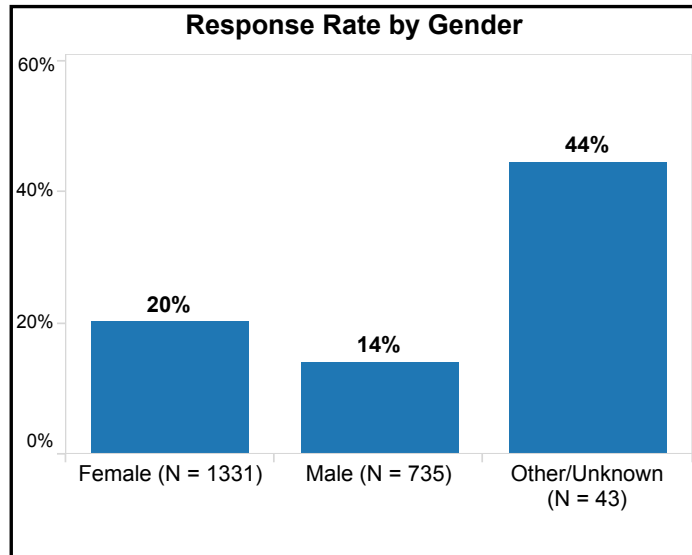
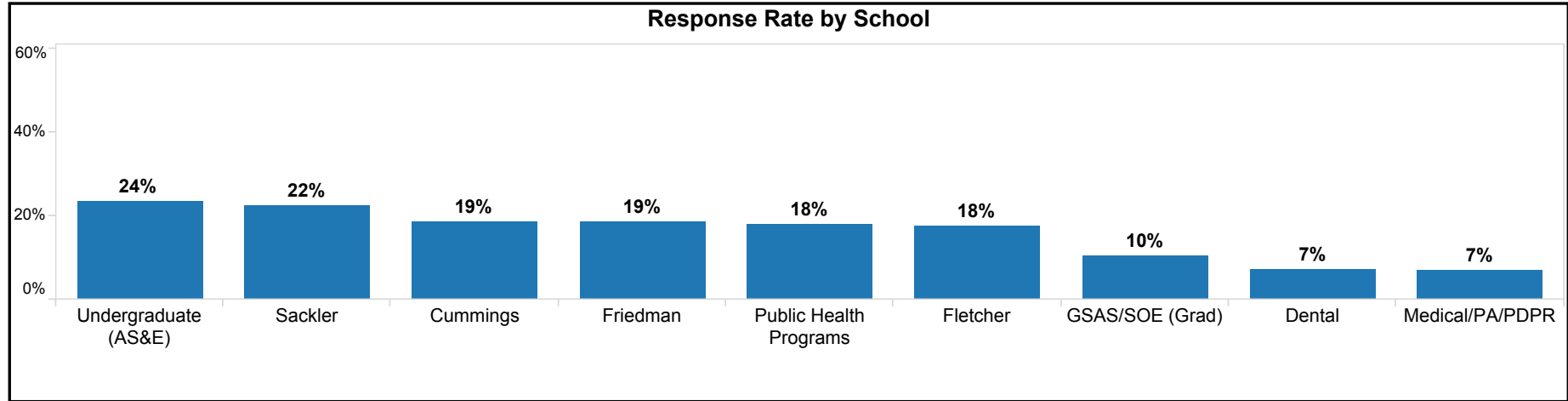

Overall Response Rate: 17.9%

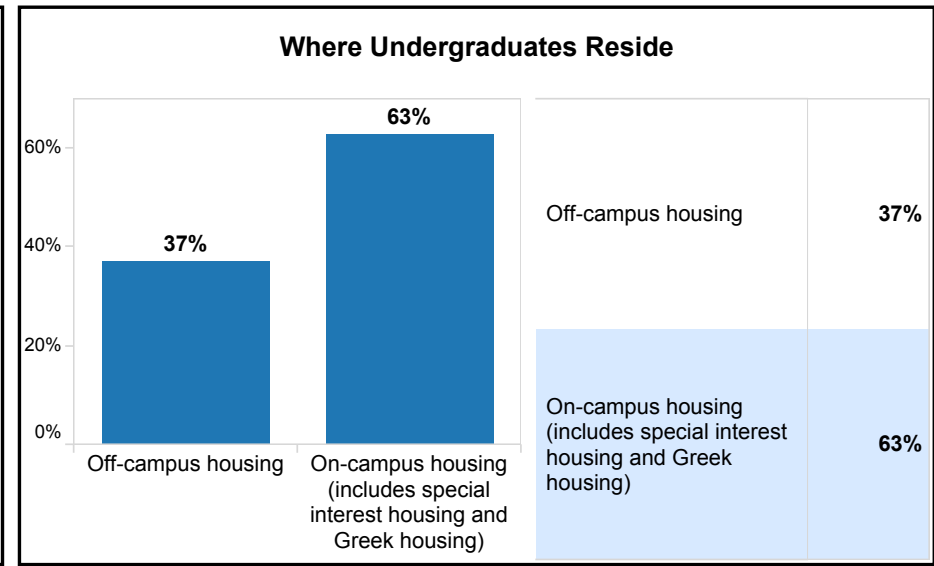
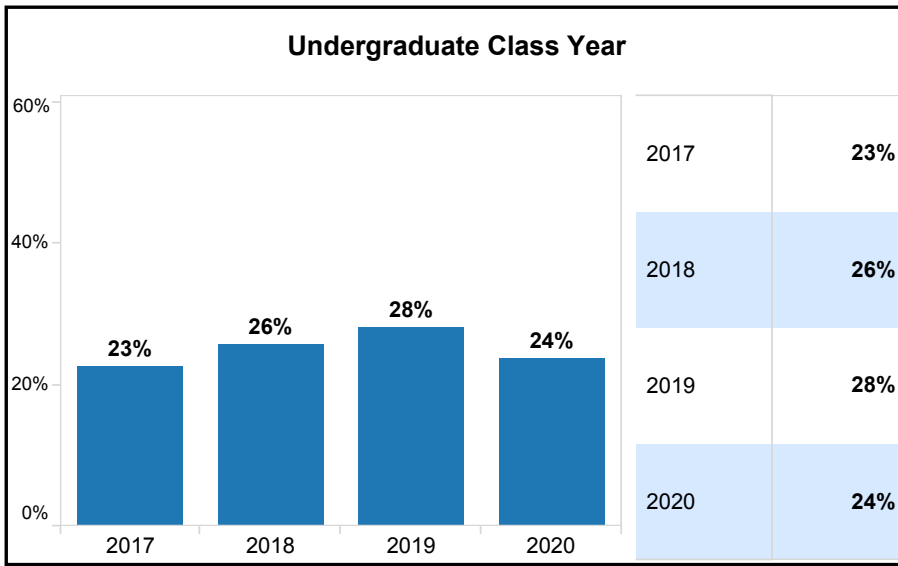
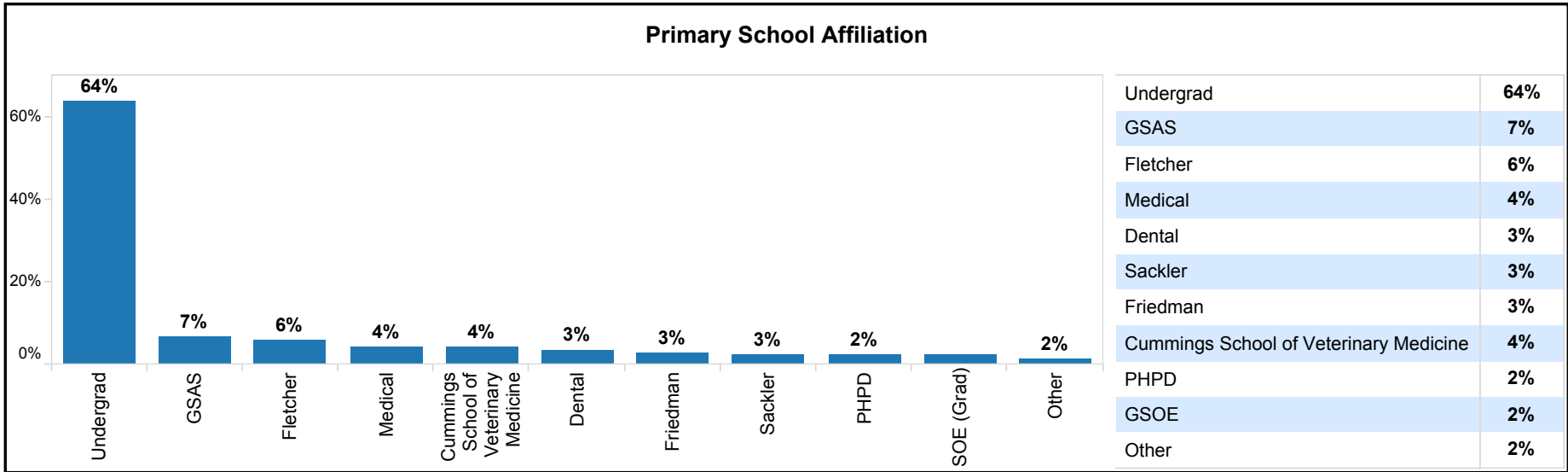

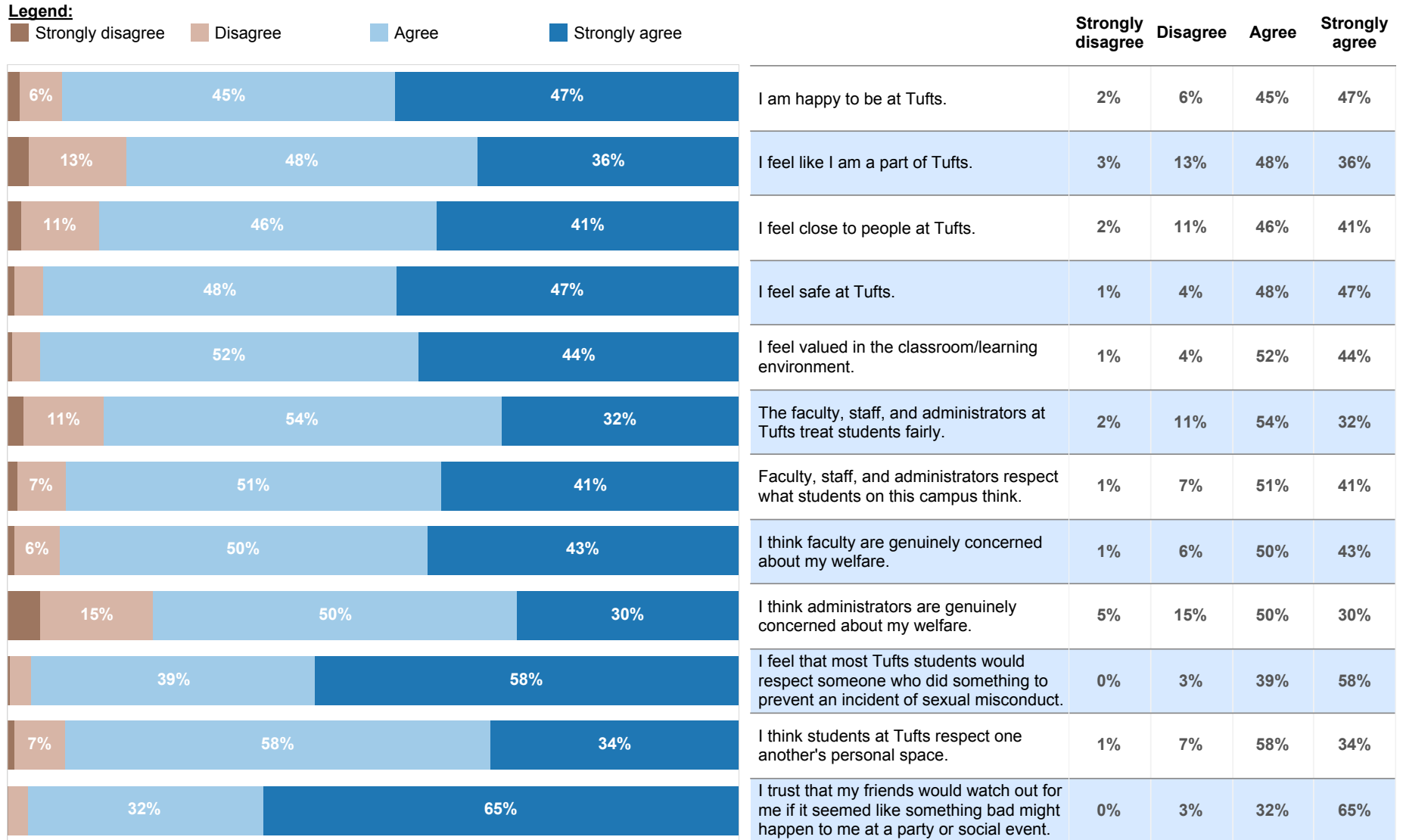

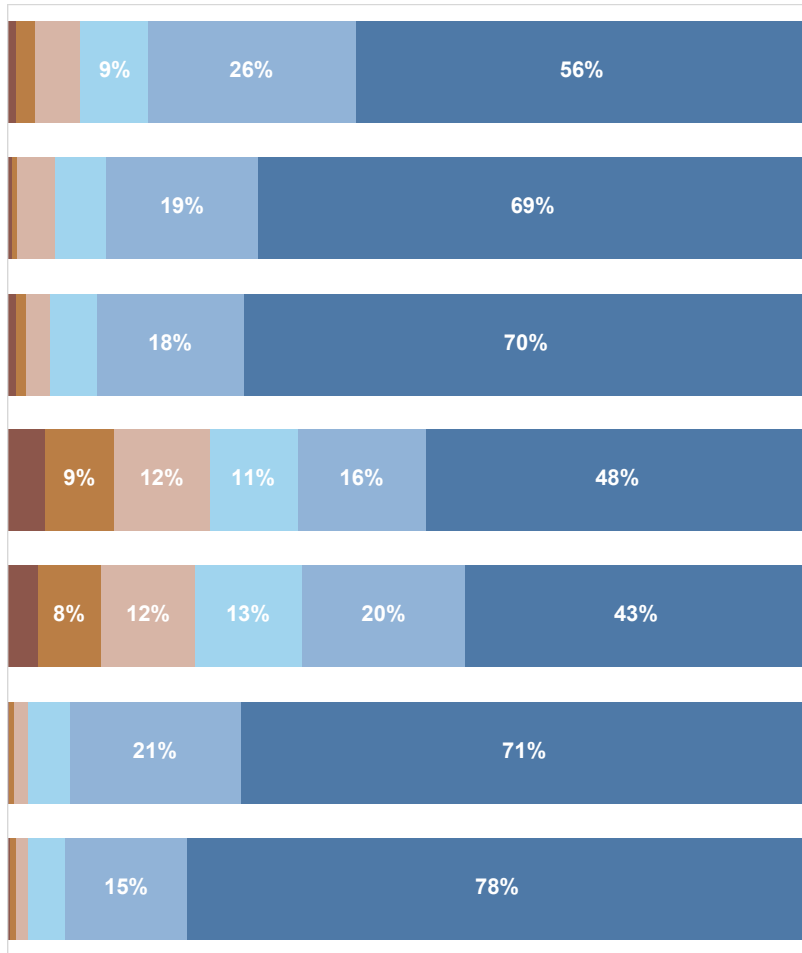

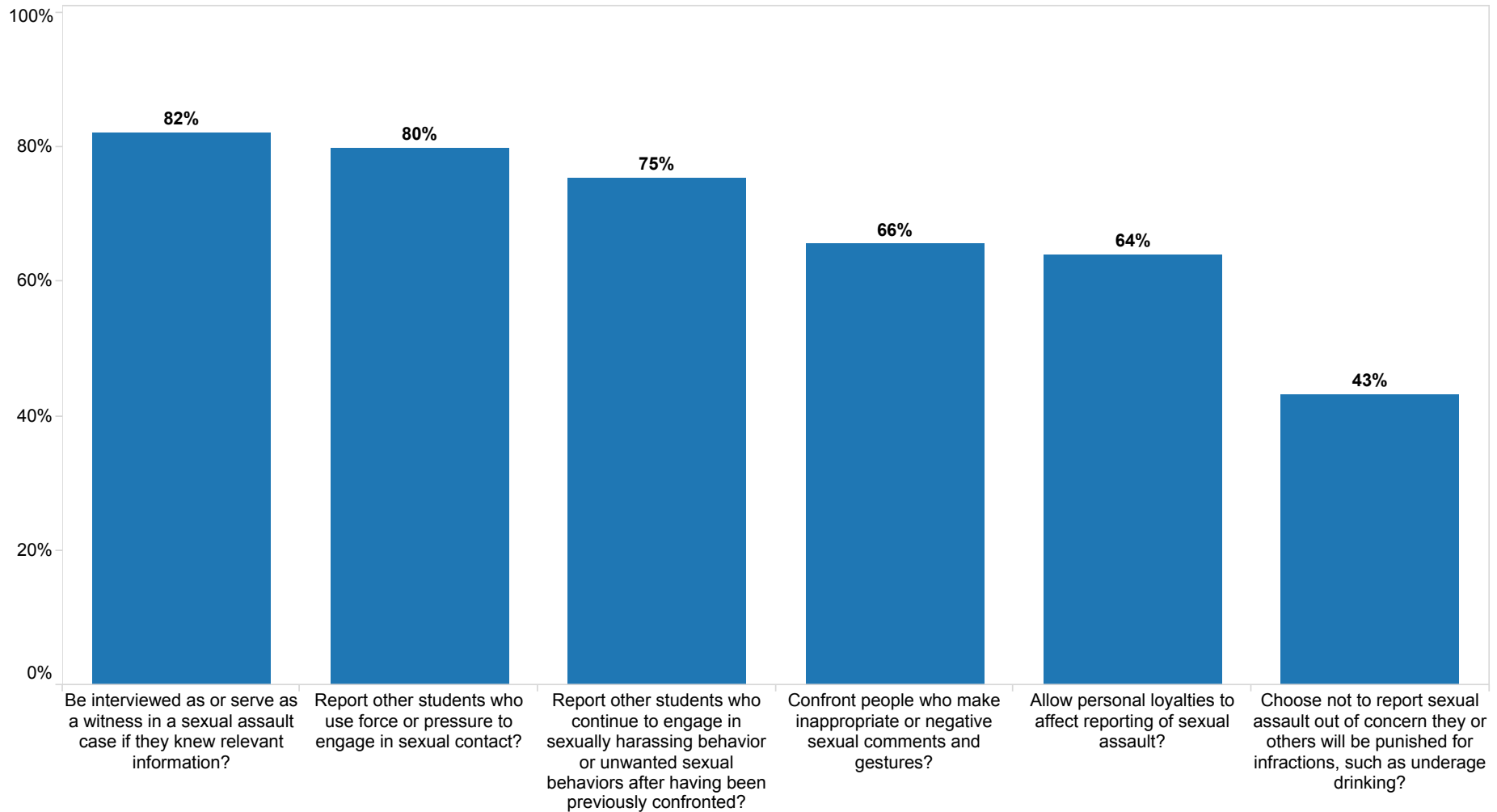

Do you think MOST Tufts students would:

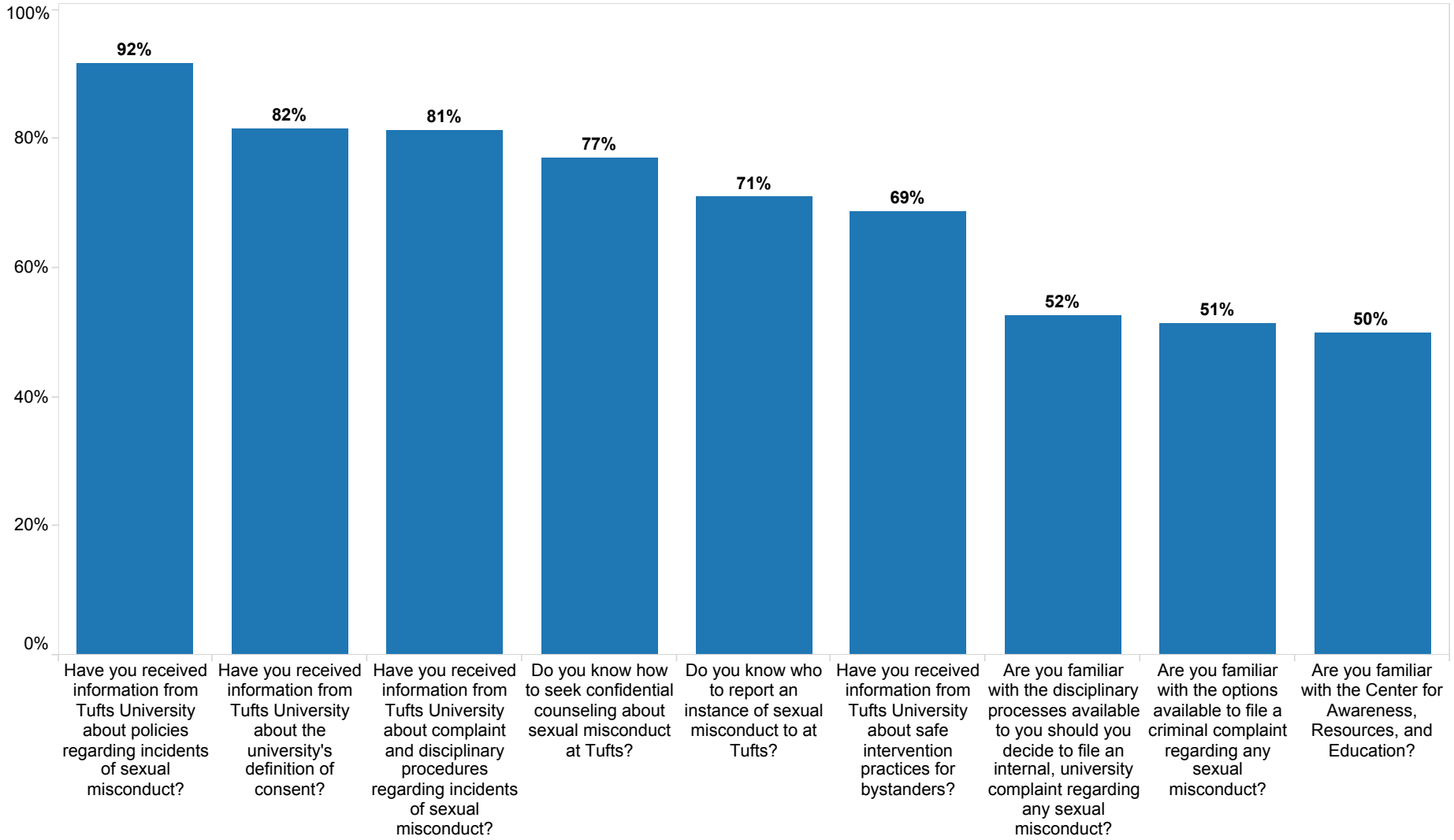

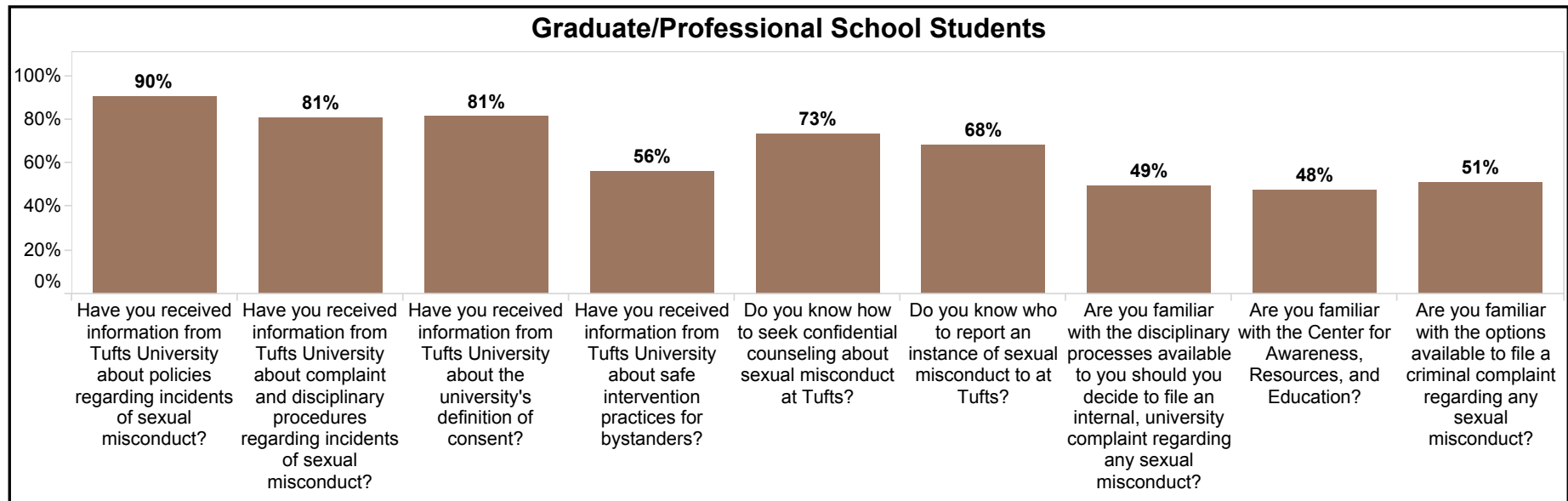
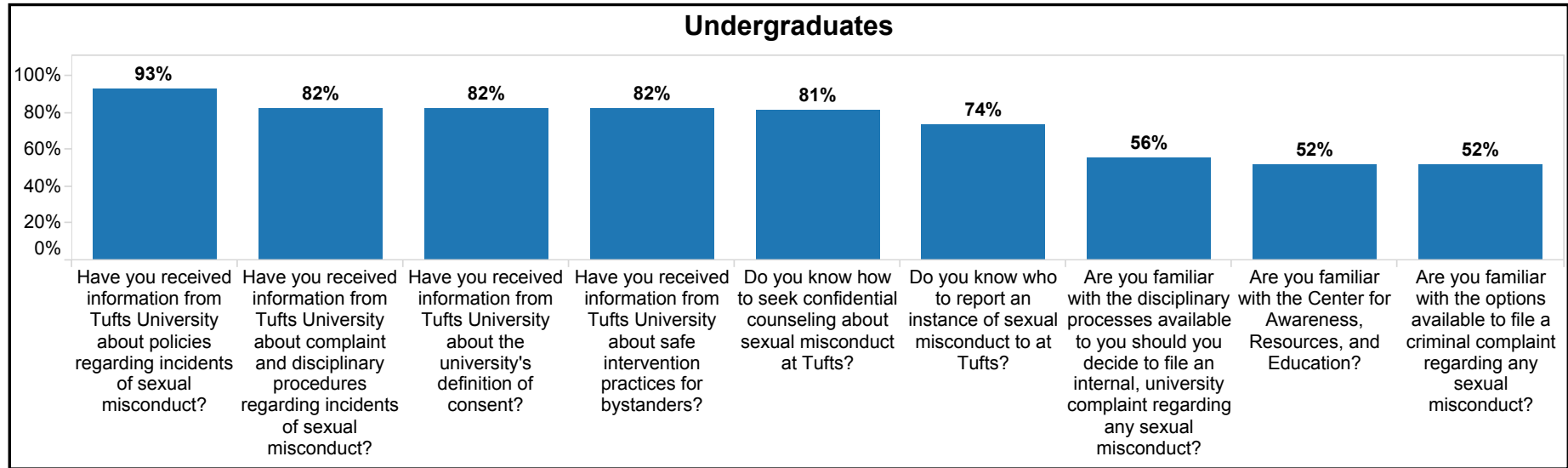
Percentage of Students Responding "Yes" to each Question

A note about the following questions:

Consent is an informed, knowing, and voluntary decision to engage mutually acceptable sexual activity. Consent cannot be obtained by use of force or under coercion. Additionally, individuals who are under the legal age of consent, mentally disabled, or incapacitated (for example, someone who has used drugs, drank alcohol, or is sleeping) cannot provide consent.

There are many different kinds of sexual misconduct prohibited by Title IX and Tufts University. The following questions describe seven types of sexual misconduct described in Tufts' Sexual Misconduct Policy (<http://oeo.tufts.edu/policies-and-procedures/sexual-misconduct-policy/>):

a. Sexual-, sex-, and/or gender-based harassment: unwelcome or unwanted conduct of a sexual nature that creates a hostile, humiliating, demeaning, discriminatory, or offensive environment. This includes, but is not limited to, unwanted sexual advances, sexist statements, comments on an individual's body or appearance, sexual jokes, and persistent requests for dates.

b. Recording of sexual activity without consent: Being recorded (photographed, videotaped, or audiotaped) without consent while undressing or engaging in sexual contact.

c. Distribution of sexual recordings without consent: Photographs, videos, or other recordings of sexual activity or undressing are circulated or distributed without the subject's consent.

d. Voyeurism: A viewer watches a non-consenting subject who is undressing or engaging in sexual contact.

e. Indecent exposure: Someone exposing their genitalia, groin, breast, and/or buttocks to a non-consenting viewer.

f. Stalking: Persistent, unwanted or unwelcome conduct that makes a person fearful, this includes following someone, making frequent phone calls, emails, or text messages, etc.

g. Relationship violence: violent or controlling behavior by a person toward an individual with whom they are currently or previously in a dating, romantic, domestic, or other intimate relationship.

In all cases, these behaviors carried out on a person who is incapacitated – for example, someone who is "passed out," asleep, or otherwise unable to give consent, or who is mentally disabled or under the legal age of consent – is always considered non-consensual.

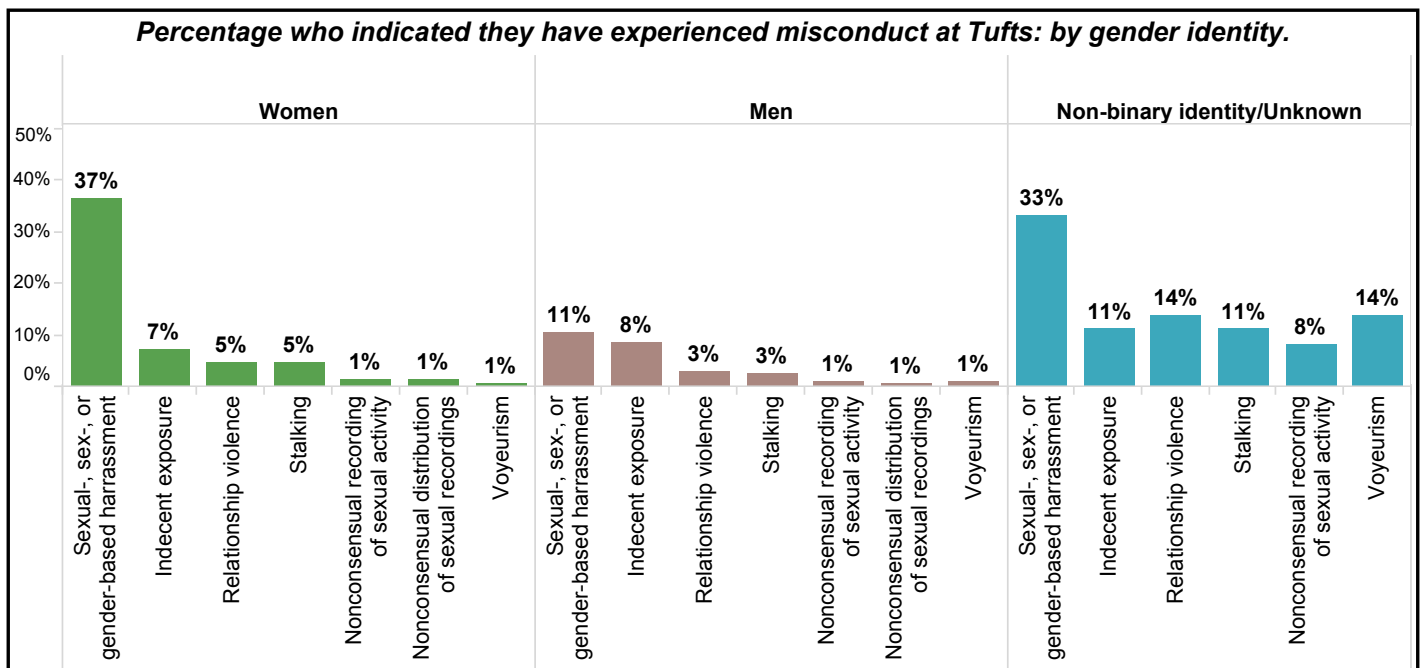
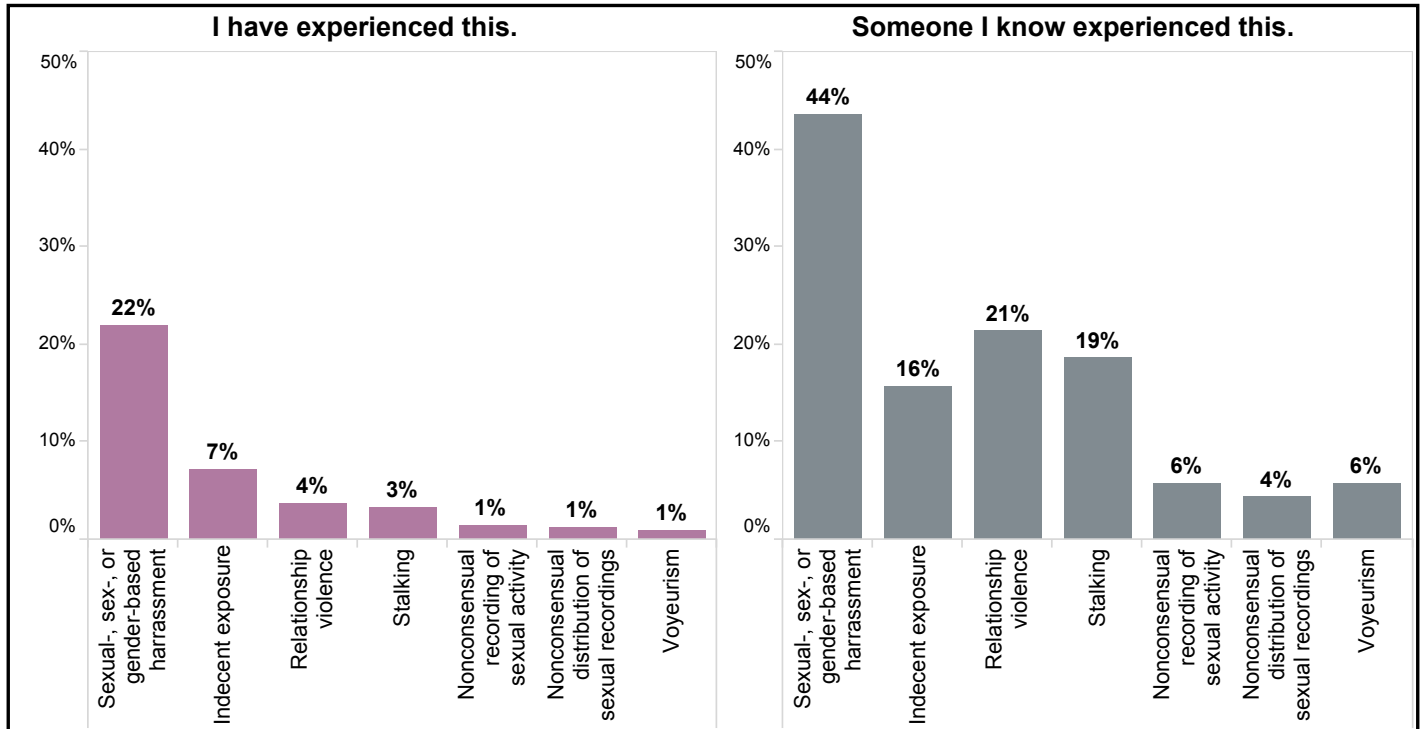

Percentage who responded...



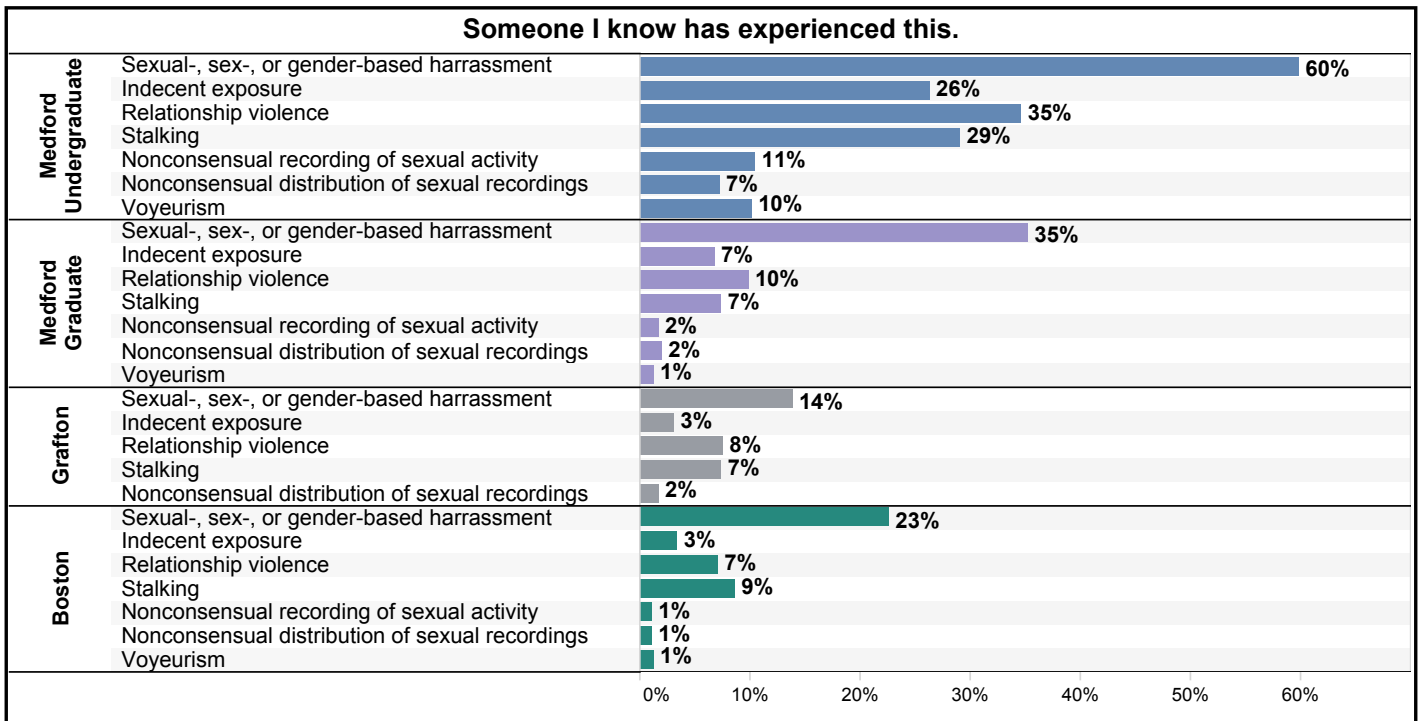
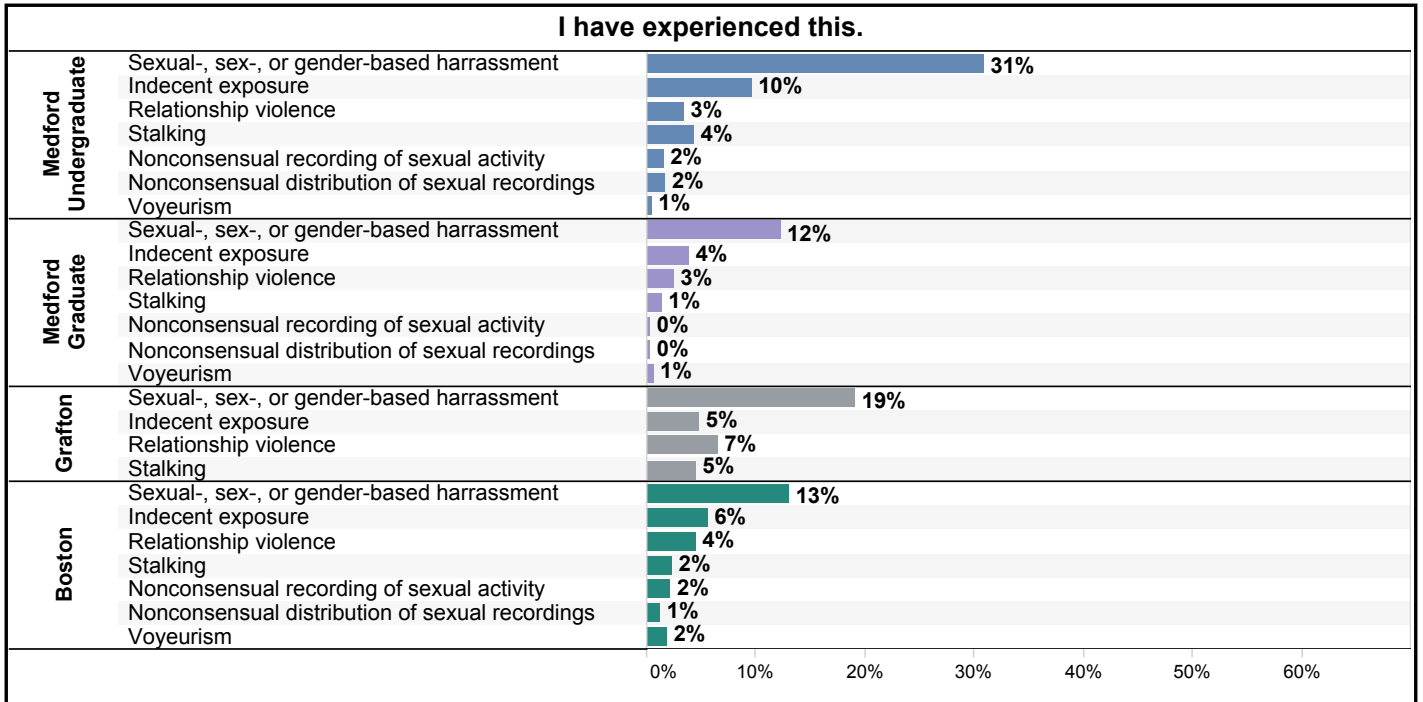

A note about the following questions:

Consent is an informed, knowing, and voluntary decision to engage mutually acceptable sexual activity. Consent cannot be obtained by use of force or under coercion. Additionally, individuals who are under the legal age of consent, mentally disabled, or incapacitated (for example, someone who has used drugs, drank alcohol, or is sleeping) cannot provide consent.

There are many different kinds of sexual misconduct prohibited by Title IX and Tufts University. The following questions describe two types of sexual misconduct described in Tufts' Sexual Misconduct Policy (<http://oeo.tufts.edu/policies-and-procedures/sexual-misconduct-policy/>):

a. Non-Consensual Sexual Intercourse/Penetration: This is defined as any sexual intercourse or penetration (anal, oral, or vaginal), no matter how slight, with any object or body part, by another person, and without consent or upon a person being unable to consent.

This includes, but is not limited to someone's penis, finger, or other object being put in your vagina, anus, or mouth; someone's mouth or tongue making contact with your genitals; or your mouth or tongue making contact with someone else's genitals without your explicit consent.

b. Non-Consensual Sexual Contact/Activity: This is defined as any intentional sexual touching, however slight, with any object, by another person, and without consent or upon a person being unable to consent.

This includes, but is not limited to forced kissing; touching of genitals; grabbing, fondling, or rubbing up against you in a sexual way (even if it is over your clothes) without your explicit consent.

In both cases, these behaviors carried out on a person who is incapacitated – for example, someone who is "passed out," asleep, or otherwise unable to give consent, or who is mentally disabled or under the legal age of consent – is always considered non-consensual.

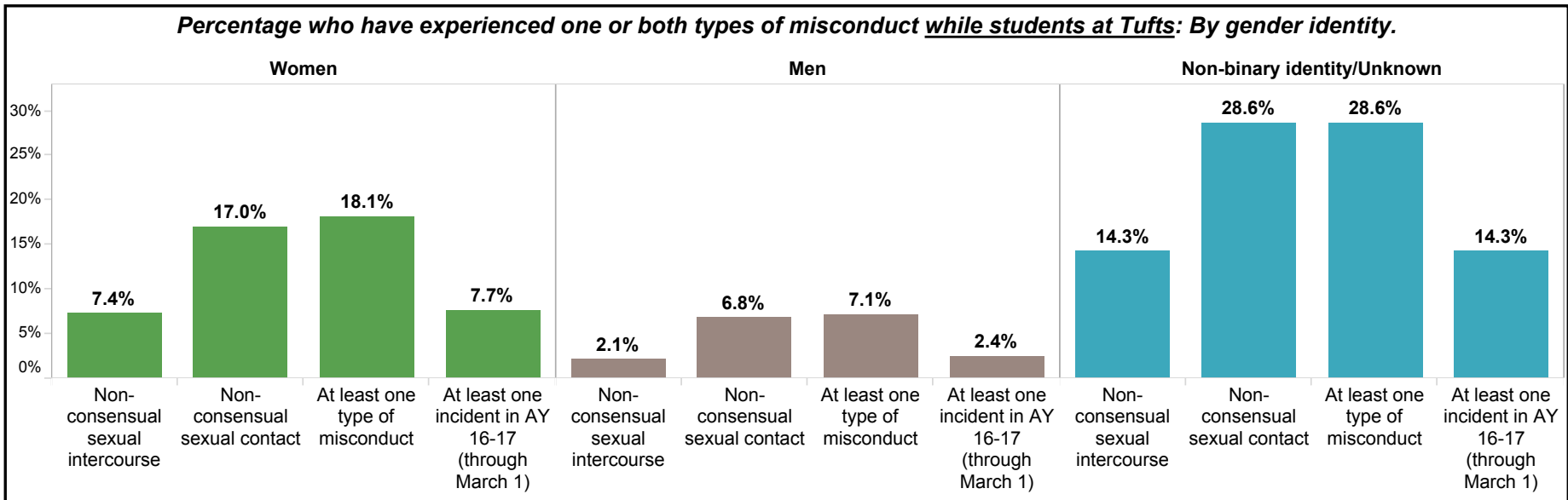

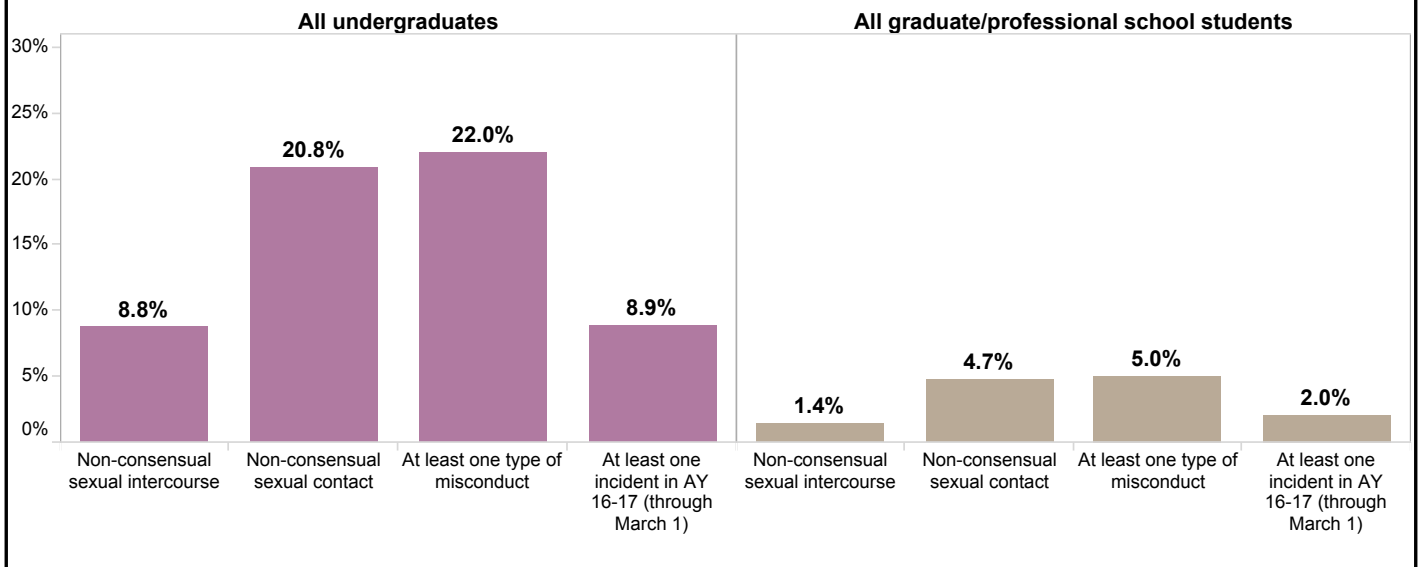

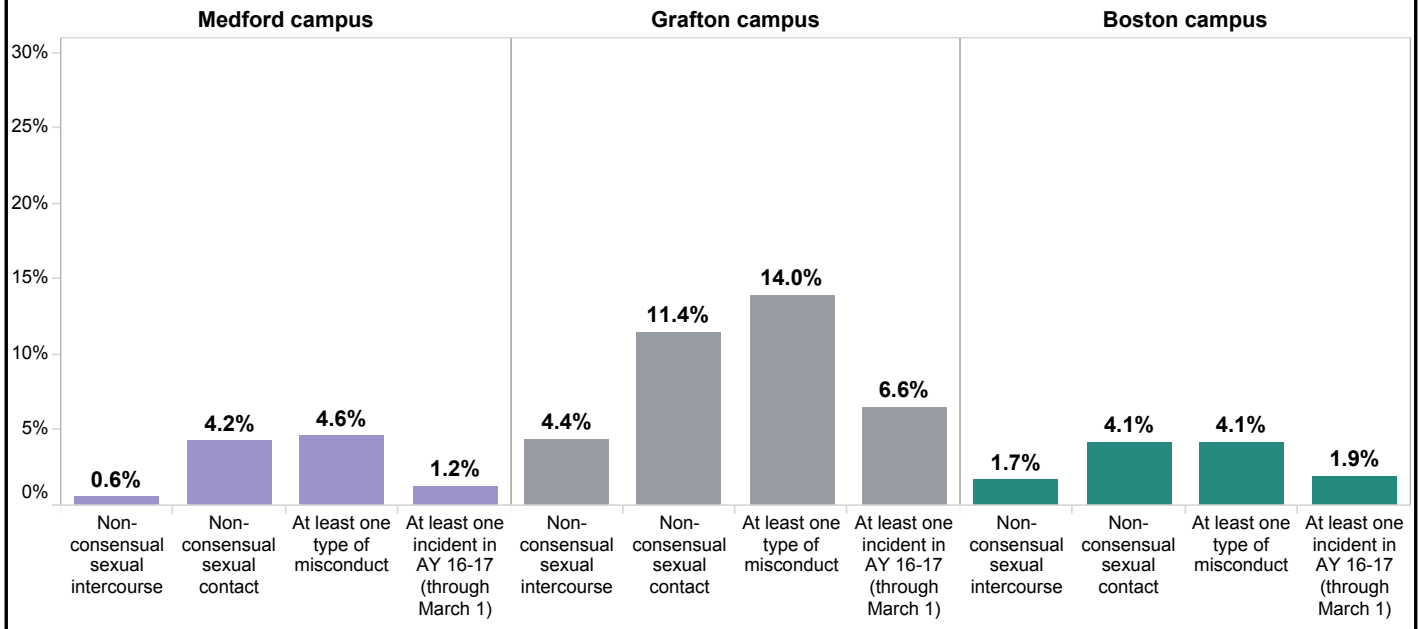

 By graduate school campus.



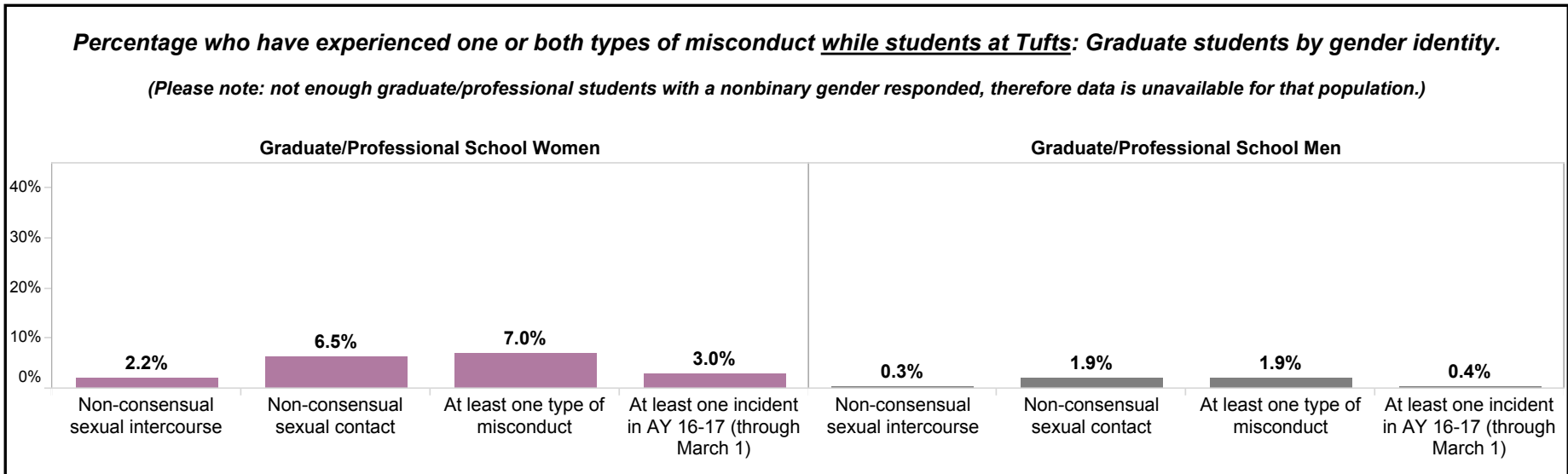
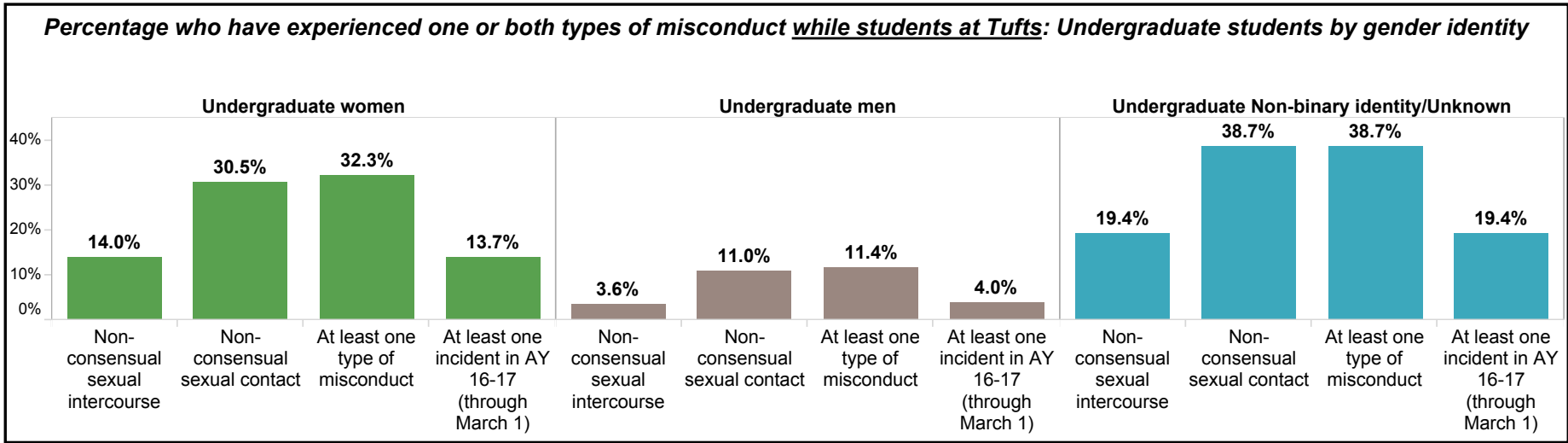

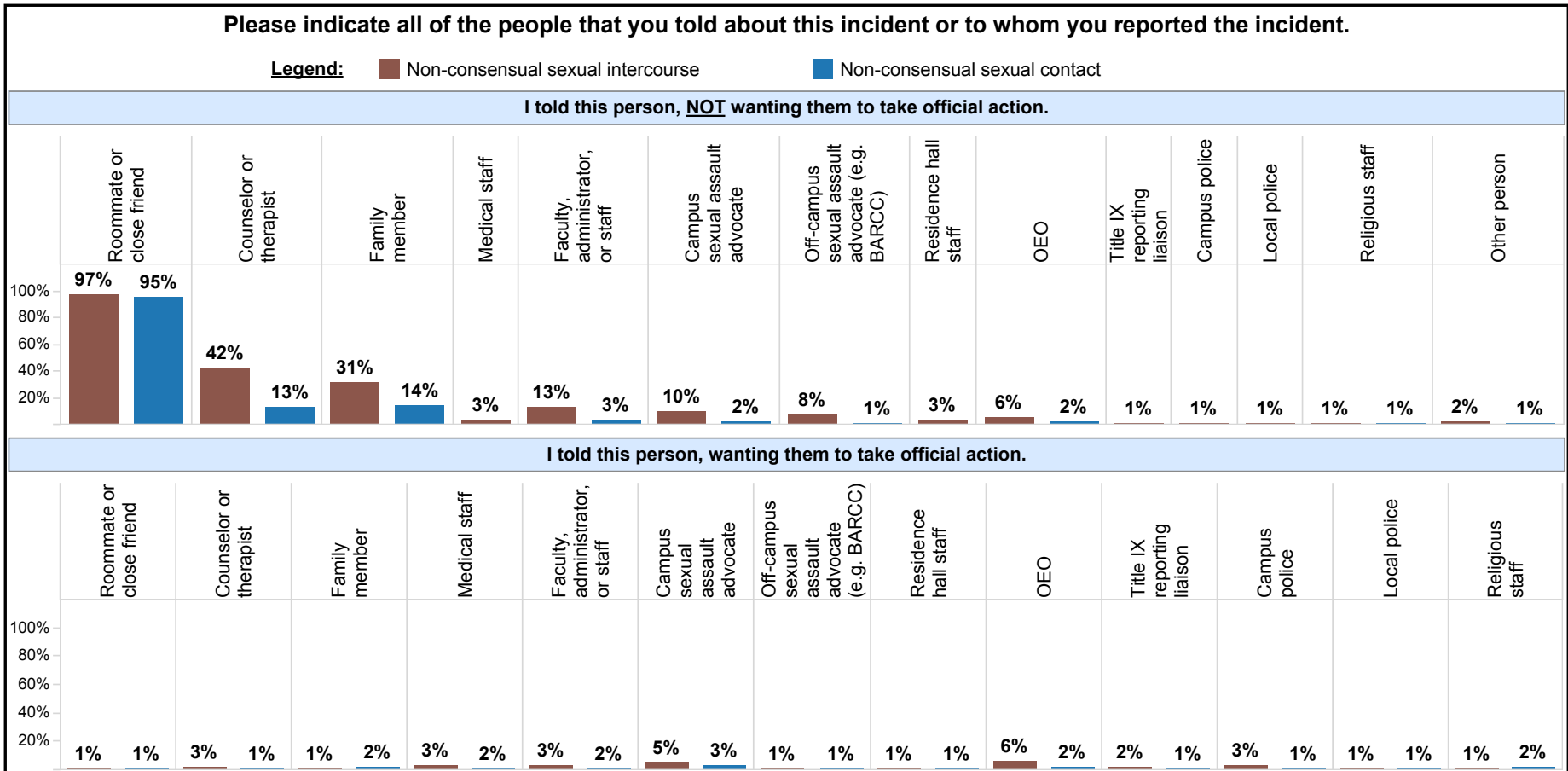
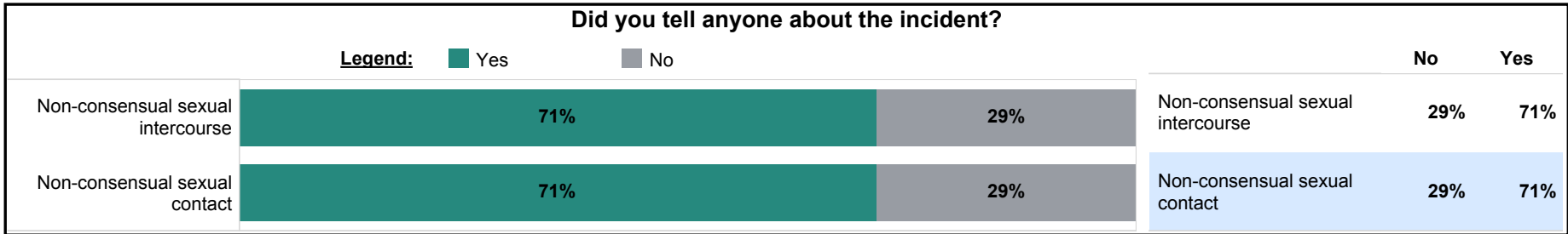
Did any of the following concerns or thoughts about reporting cross your mind when you decided whether or not to share your experience? Check all that apply.

Legend: ■ Non-consensual sexual intercourse ■ Non-consensual sexual contact

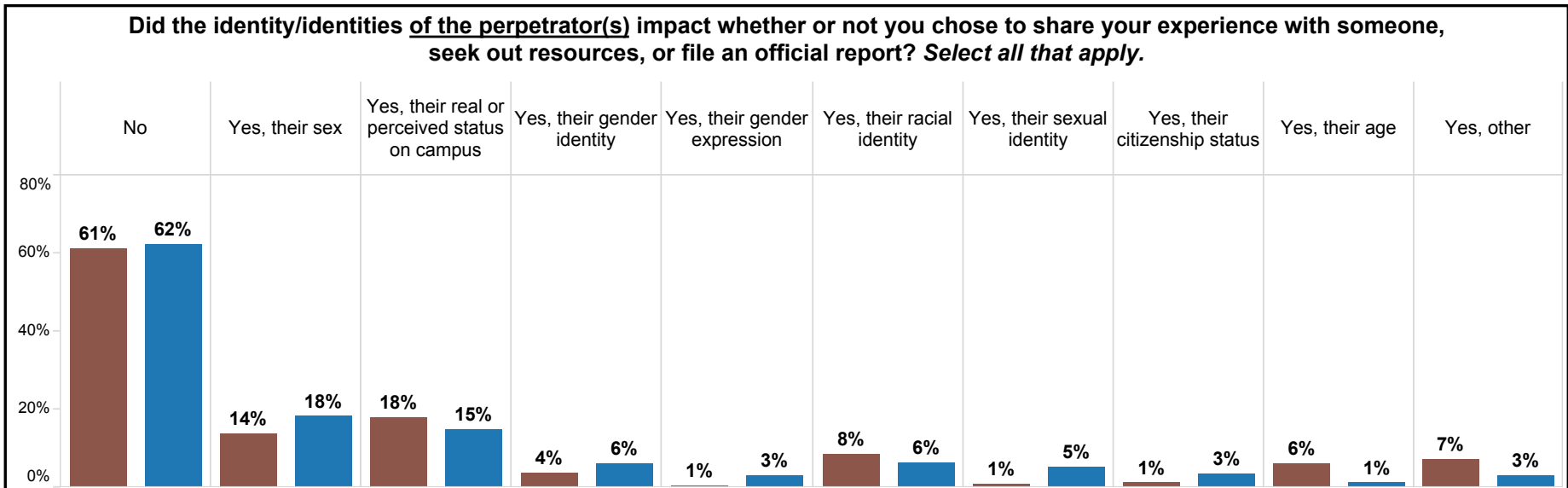
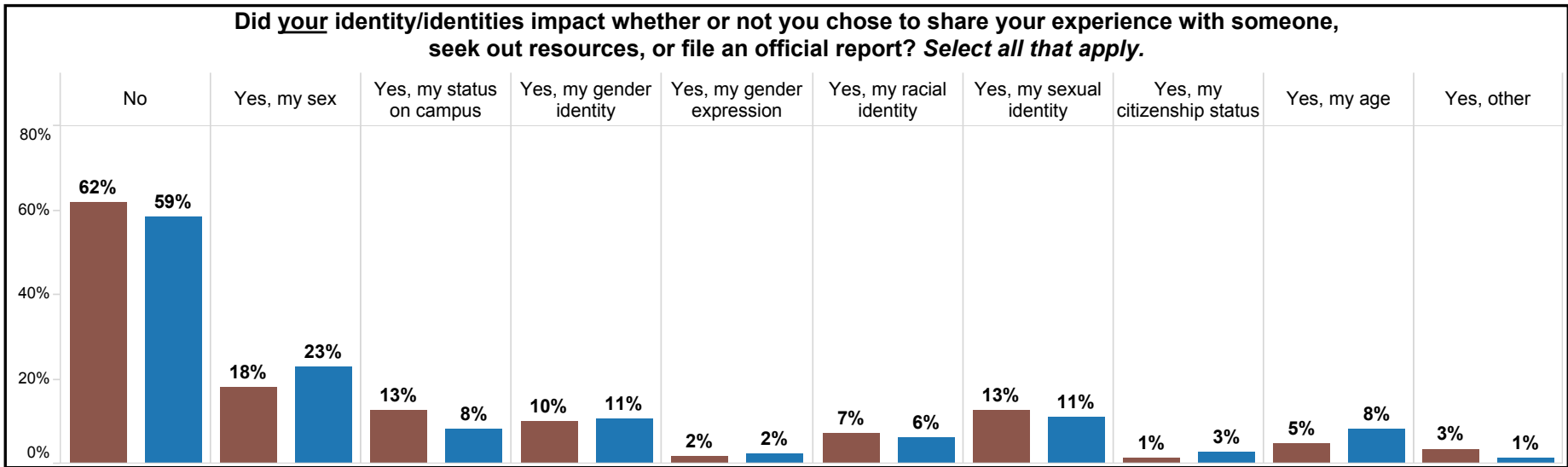

- * Educate students throughout the year and throughout their time at Tufts
- * Mandate attendance for all sexual misconduct prevention workshops/lectures
- * Advertise or promote programs or resources related to sexual misconduct prevention
- * Make sure all students understand what consent is
- * Make information about how to report sexual misconduct more widely available
- * Improve orientation programming

Suggestions frequently made:

- * Abolish Greek life
- * Increase awareness, education about sexual misconduct
- * Implement stricter regulations for parties
- * Improve supports for victims of sexual misconduct
- * Encourage victims to report sexual misconduct
- * Implement stricter punishments for perpetrators of sexual misconduct
- * Create safer party spaces
